Also, the rain patterns in Africa, Asia, and Europe will change causing areas of high rain to have little rain and the deserts will experience more rain. Droughts and wildfires will occur more frequently and over one million species of animals will become extinct in 2050.

Fortunately, there are actions to lower the amount of carbon dioxide from being released into the atmosphere, but it will soon be too late to stop the effects of global warming. These actions are simple, household ways that can reduce the amount of carbon dioxide you release into the atmosphere. Some of these actions include replacing a regular light bulb with a compact fluorescent light bulb, or by turning your thermostat up 2 degrees in the summer, and down 2 degrees in the winter. By doing these two things, you can prevent thousands of pounds of carbon dioxide from being released into the atmosphere. At the Dinner Show band member parents were given the chance to eat, enjoy the music provided by various music groups at the school, and bid on silent auction items. After performing, performers could head



Baklava, Anyone?

Imagine that crispy sweetness crunching on your tongue, as a bit of honey drizzles down the side of your mouth. Now, doesn't *that* sound mouthwatering? Well, this is baklava. Baklava is a Middle Eastern pastry made of many layers of paper-thin dough, with a filling of ground nuts, bakes, and then drenched in syrup of honey, and sometimes orange blossom water. Now, you will learn how to make this tasty treat!!!

The Actual Sweet:

The Homemade Syrup



A Box of "Filo" (paper-thin dough) 2 Sticks of butter (non-salted) 2 lbs of Walnuts 1 Teaspoon of Orange Blossom Water 1 Cup of Sugar 2 Teaspoons of Cinnamon Cooking Spray

Preparing the Syrup:

Boil the sugar, water and lemon juice altogether in a pot until the mixture is slightly thick. Let it cool. *How to Make It:*

Preheat the oven to 375 Fahrenheit. Spray the bottom of a 16" by 12" pan with cooking spray. Next, melt the two sticks of butter. Divide the box of "Filo," one by one, and layer them onto the pan. Make sure to brush each layer of "Filo" with the melted butter, lightly, until half of the box is finished. Now, crush the walnuts into fine parts, and mix them with the sugar and cinnamon. Mix the sugar, cinnamon and chopped walnuts with the Orange Blossom Water. Spread this mixture evenly onto the "Filo" that is placed in the pan. Take the remaining "Filo" one by one, and layer them on top of the walnut mixture. Once again, brush each layer lightly with butter. Now, with a sharp knife, cut the unbaked Baklava into diamond shapes. After cutting this, pour the remaining butter on the surface of the "Filo." Place the pan in the oven for 30-40 minutes, until it turns goldishbrown. Take the pan out of the oven, and add the Homemade Syrup to the Baklava while it is still hot. Let it cool, and enjoy!



The United States Senate has passed a law to build a 700-mile wall on the US-Mexico border, with much protest from the Latino community in the US Southwest.


