FIRE STATION 19'S NEW RIDE

Remember when you were little and you used to play with toy fire trucks? Well, adults still do, but they play with real ones. Fire Station 19 just got a new toy. Now, Fire Station 19 has a new addition to their fire fighting force.

Fire Station 19 is located on Foothill Boulevard across the street from the Glendale 2 Freeway onramp and New Mayor's Park. It is also neighbors with the Montessori Preschool. The Fire Station got a new truck in early March. New features are air conditioning (most of the crew members have never had air conditioning in there fire engines before), seats located inside the truck, an automatic transmission, and all new equipment. This includes brand new hoses, ladders, and other necessary equipment like smoke ejectors and chainsaws.

Another useful feature is that it has 300 feet of hose which shoots out water at 1,500 gallons per minute. Each truck costs roughly \$350,000, and weighs 42,000 pounds (21 tons). This truck is one of 260 trucks distributed to the Los Angeles County Fire Department which will help fight fires and save lives every day. They have taken fire fighting to the next level.



MOJARRADI MEDAL Winner at LA County Science Fair

n Saturday, April 28, Amir Mojarradi won third prize at the Los Angeles County Science Fair. There were 40 students from

schools all across Southern California competing for the first prize, one hundred dollars, and bragging rights for having won one of the best science projects there all of LA. Since the topic for the contest was to build something related to light physics and magnetism, Amir made a high voltage power supply that runs off of batteries and uses a television transformer to make the battery much more powerful. It takes the batteries and changes the electricity of it to alternate current which is sent through a TV transformer making 5000 volts of electricity. The high voltage power supply also makes a one inch spark

PET FOOD RECALL

n March 16th, Menu Foods Inc. initiated a voluntary recall involving a large number of both dog and cat foods. The products are sold by many different distributors under different brand names that people may be feeding their dogs or cats. The affected products are both moist (packaged in pouches) and canned diets. They are described as "cuts and gravy" style pet foods. The recall started after reports that at least ten pets encountered kidney failures and died after eating the food, according to the Food and Drug Administration. Forty cat food brands and 51 dog food brands were involved with the recall. At this time, no dry dog or cat food show to be involved in pet injury or death. Some signs that your pet may be poisoned include sluggishness, jaundice (yellow whites of the eyes, gums or belly), fevers, and severe, persistent vomiting. MCDONALD'S AGAINST THE MCJOB

cDonalds has started a public petition against the word McJob in protest of dictionary's definition.

"McJob: a non-stimulating, low paid job with few prospects, especially one created by the expansion of the service sector;" originated as a slang term and first described by the Oxford English Dictionary online in March of 2001. Many people would make the connection with McDonald's, but the company thinks otherwise. "We believe that this is out of date, out of touch with reality and most importantly it is insulting to those talented, committed, hard-working people who serve the public every day," wrote David Fairhurst, the company's chief people officer in northern Europe. It should be redefined to "reflect a job that is stimulating, rewarding and offers genuine opportunities for career progression and skills that last a lifetime."

They have decided to launch a "high-profile public petition" in Britain and the United Kingdoms to change the definition in the Oxford English Dictionary, which is considered by many wordsmiths to be the gold standard for the English Language. They have tried several times before, without success, to redefine this word. Once in 2003 they took it to court in the United States and failed. Will they be able to change or remove this word which many people find accurate and appropriate?

BYE-BYE, MY Honey Fly

t was two years ago when honeybees started vanishing from America at an alarming rate. This is a huge threat to the farmers' crops and livelihoods.

The pollination of flowers by honeybees contributes to America's economy up to \$14 billion. If the bees are gone, the price of avocados, almonds, kiwis, and other fruits and vegetables will increase. As a result, consumers will pay higher prices.

In 24 states throughout America, more than half of the honeybee population has disappeared. Beekeepers reported that 70 percent of their bees had vanished. Bradshaw, 50, a Californian beekeeper, found half of his 100 million bees missing.

"I have never seen anything like it," Bradshaw said. "Box after box after box are just empty. There's nobody home."

Since bees play an essential role in the production of nuts, the loss of these honeybees will surely affect California's almond crop. Since honeybees play a big role on the production of almonds, the mass extinction will decrease the prosperity of the almond industry.

Some researchers suggest that this could be the AIDS of the bee industry. Others even call it the "colony collapse disorder." However, the situation isn't totally hopeless. Growers are actually developing a new way to spread the pollen across plants, according to researchers. The strategies run the gamut from giant blowers to helicopters. Recently, researchers have been trying to develop "self-compatible" almond trees, which require fewer honeybees.

"The real question is why they leave," told Jerry Hayes, a bee expert from the Florida Department of Agriculture, to the Orlando Sentinel newspaper. "Bees are highly social insects. They don't just leave their babies and the queen."

CREAM PUFFS

nvision yourself tasting chilled vanilla cream custard wrapped in a puff pastry with chocolate drizzle unfolding in your mouth. Picture the smooth, rich, creamy custard melting on your palette. This tasty dessert could easily be yours by following the simple instructions below.

(Makes approximately 3 puffs.)

1 cup water

3/4 stick of butter, cut into 6 pieces
Seasoning: 1 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon sugar
1 cup of all-purpose flour (scooped and leveled)
Exactly 1 cup of eggs- about 5 "large" eggs (blend them together thoroughly with a fork before measuring)
Egg Glaze

1 egg

1 teaspoon of water

1 pinch salt

Blend ingredients together in a small bowl

Preheat the oven to 450 F. First, boil the water in a medium size pan with the butter and seasoning. Once the butter has melted, remove the pan from stove. Now, sift the flour in and beat rapidly until smooth. Once blended, beat over moderate heat for a few minutes, until the dough begins to ball up and no longer sticks to the sides of the pan. Pour the dough into a bowl and stir with a spatula for about 30 seconds to cool it slightly. Next, add ¼ cup of the blended eggs and mix for 2 minutes. Then repeat this process twice, and split the final ¼ of egg in half. Mix the dough together until thick. The dough should not fall off the spatula when lifted. Next, fill your pastry bag with the warm dough and squeeze dollops 1 inch apart from each other. Gently paint each dollop with the eggs glaze. Cook for 20 minutes at 450 F until they have doubled their size and are golden brown. When you take puffs out of the oven, slice each in half immediately.

Vanilla Cream Filling

(Makes approximately 3 cups of filling.)

6 egg yolks
½ cup sugar
A pinch of salt
½ cup of all purpose flour
2 cups of heated half and half
1 tablespoon of vanilla extract
2 tablespoons of unsalted butter



Whisk the egg yokes in a saucepan and slowly add the mixed sugar and salt. Continue to beat until thick and lemon-colored. Now, add the flour and whisk it in. Dribble the half and half in little by little. Stir over moderate heat until custard comes to a boil. Once lumps form, mix till smooth over low heat. Your cream custard should hold its shape in a spoon. If too thick, slowly add more half and half. Remove from heat and blend the vanilla extract and butter. Let the filling chill for about 15 minutes.

How to Bring it all Together

Once puffs are cooled and cream filling is chilled, place a dollop of the vanilla custard between the two puff pastry slices. Drizzle chocolate over puffs, and place in the fridge for 20 minutes. Enjoy!

has many different religious perspectives, it's still an important part of several unique cultures today.



NEVER To Be Forgotten







The boys tipped off second at the start of third beriod and school one once again prevailed, this time in a tight game. School One started off sluggish with School Two playing tight defense and hitting there shots







Mathews, most inspirational; and Scott Grey, best defensive player, for School Four. The best offensive player in School





he National Football League (NFL) season is over with the Colts coming out as the Super Bowl champions. The season may be over, but the off-season still has a long way to go, including the NFL draft. The NFL draft can make or break dreams, in which professional football teams draft college football players in order to enhance their franchise. As always, the draft will be held in New York, on April 28th-April 29th. So, what's in store for this year?

To start this draft, the Oakland Raiders will have the first pick. The Raiders will likely either draft JaMarcus Russel, a Quarter Back (QB) from Louisiana State University (LSU), or Calvin Johnson, a Wide Receiver (WR) from Georgia Tech University (GTU). At first, it looked like JaMarcus had no competition for the number one pick, but as work out days approached on February 24th- 27th, scouts were

In return, the Texans get a future first round pick for the 2008 draft while still maintaining a top ten pick for this year's draft. According to NFL.com, this trade was lopsided to the Texans.

While Calvin Johnson and JaMarcus Russell are racing for number one pick, names from the expected top ten picks include Brady Quinn, Adrian Peterson, Joe Thomas, Levi Brown, Amobi Okoye, Gaines Adams, Alan Branch, and LaRon Landry.

"We have lots of talent in this year's draft and there may even be some other names in the top ten picks," stated John Madden. NFL.com believes, as well as the NFL commissioner, that the participants in this draft will shape the future of the NFL.




Interestingly, he is not the only one who teaches students
