4 Directed project	<ul> <li>Students create their own project according to a set of parameters the teacher provides; they experience a "beginning-to-end" process without wasting time searching for an appropriate task</li> <li>The teacher typically structures the general focus, design, duration, and degree of difficulty of the project, such as working with data from a broad but finite catalog of pre-selected contents, deciding the range of time students have to identify a specific topic and question, focus on some relevant data elements, and prepare an "end product" such as a poster or report</li> </ul>
5 Custom project	<ul> <li>Students use geospatial technology while conducting a GIS project entirely of their own design</li> <li>Teachers guide students to tackle independently the processes of conceiving a question; seeking, sifting, and generating data; examining data in search of patterns and relationships to refine the question or improve the data accessed; integrating and analyzing the resources; and acting on the information gleaned</li> </ul>
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
